A Musical Joke (K522)

This piece is also known as 'The Village Musicians' and is one of a few works in which a serious composer deliberately produces a parady of an incompetent composer.

The work, written in 1787, consists of wrong notes, structural defects and the like, but the average listener might not notice them except for the dissonance of the horns and the disastrous last chords which bring the music to an abrupt end.

Marche Slave (Slavonic March)

This was written in a fit of patriotism in 1876 for a concert in aid of Serb soldiers wounded in the Serbo/Turkish war. It was originally known as the Serbo/Russian March.
